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Introduction:

<u>Author</u>: Paul the Apostle <u>Timing</u>: 58/59 or 64/65AD <u>Audience</u>: A letter to Timothy

The book of 1st Timothy was written by Paul (a,k.a., Saul) shortly after leaving Ephesus over the Demetrius incident. Timothy (Translated "one who honors God"), a profound believer was from Derbe or Lystra in Asia Minor. Timothy was the son of Eunice, a Jewess, and a Greek man who is unnamed. His grandmother, Lois was a pious woman; as was her daughter, who had significant influence in the life of Timothy.

Paul met Timothy in 51 or 52AD and Timothy became a traveling companion of Paul and Silas. Timothy was recognized early on as someone who would be important to the church. The underlying theme of the book is widely accepted to be primarily instruction on church leadership. I find it broader that that thus the Title of this study.

Chapter five discusses elders and widows and how the church should handle them.

Chapter Five

- 5:1 Rebuke not an elder, but entreat *him* as a father; *and* the younger men as brethren;
- 5:2 The elder women as mothers; the younger as sisters, with all purity.
- 1. What is "elder" referring to here? Act 14:23, 1Pet 1:5 Why were these rules important? 2Tim 2:24, Gal 6:1.

- 5:3 Honor widows that are widows indeed [actually, in reality].
- 5:4 But if any widow have children or nephews, let them learn first to show piety [ye worship] at home, and to requite [repay] their parents: for that is good and acceptable before God.
- 5:5 Now she that is a widow indeed, and desolate [destitute or deprived of inhabitants], trusteth in God, and continueth in supplications [humble and earnest prayer] and prayers night and day.

	5:11 But the younger widows refuse: for when they have begun to wax wanton against

- 5:17 Let the elders that rule well be counted worthy of double honor, especially they who labor in the word and doctrine.
- 5:18 For the Scripture saith, Thou shalt not muzzle the ox that treadeth out the corn. And, The laborer *is* worthy of his reward.
- 7. Explain verse 18. Relate the un-muzzled ox to the elders worthy of double honor. 1Cor 8:9-10

- 5:19 Against an elder receive not an accusation, but before two or three witnesses.
- 5:20 Them that sin rebuke before all, that others also may fear.
- 5:21 I charge *thee* before God, and the Lord Jesus Christ, and the elect angels, that thou observe these things without preferring one before another, doing nothing by partiality.
- 8. Does this refer to a pastor? How is this different from the Matthew 18 principle? Mat 18:15-17 Can you approach a pastor directly if he offends you? 2Cor 13:1, John8:17

- 5:22 Lay hands suddenly on no man, neither be partaker of other men's sins: keep thyself pure.
- 5:23 Drink no longer water, but use a little wine for thy stomach's sake and thine often infirmities.
- 9. Does this say not to beat people up or is it talking about ordination? Acts 6:6, 2Tim 1:6 Why would Paul give Timothy the advice in verse 23? Timothy's health?

- 5:24 Some men's sins are open beforehand, going before to judgment; and some *men* they follow after.
- 5:25 Likewise also the good works *of some* are manifest beforehand; and they that are otherwise cannot be hid.
- 10. Explain the use of the term "beforehand." What is Paul advising Timothy here?
